Dr. Laura Kline joined Schoolcraft students, faculty, and staff for a virtual SCII Focus Series seminar on the importance of intercultural communication. In her interactive presentation she explored with us the ways we "(mis) communicate" and "(mis) understand" one another thanks to our cultural contexts. Through the interactive use of images and videos she helped us better understand that even when we interact with one another our meaning is often not translated properly across cultures. Dr. Kline is a frequent visitor on our campus and once again she helped us better appreciate our need to explore and understand

cultural competency issues.

<u>Dr. Laura Kline</u> has a BA from Georgetown in Government and a PhD in Slavic Languages and Literature from the University of Michigan. She was the Director of Global Studies at Wayne State University and taught classes in Russian language, literature, global studies, and culture. # Between Political and Climate Change in Southeast Asia By Colleen Pilgrim



The <u>Council for American Overseas Research Centers (CAORC)</u> along with their partners the <u>Center for Kmer Studies</u> and the <u>Inya Institute</u> have selected me for their two-week Faculty Development Seminar this May in Cambodia. Our group of faculty members from across the United States will attend lectures, meetings with media professionals, civil society and environmental organizations, and site visits across Cambodia. We will explore Cambodia's culture, history, and natural habitats with visits to the capital city of <u>Phnom Penh</u>, <u>Angkor</u>, and the <u>Tonle Sap Lake</u>.

The faculty seminar focuses on politics and climate change in Southeast Asia and will allow me to better understand the challenges faced by local communities, leaders, and politicians. Mental health issues are often addressed on an individual level, however national policies and programs are vital to addressing mental health and well-being. Exposure to unfavorable social, economic, geopolitical, and environmental circumstances – including poverty, violence, inequality, and environmental deprivation increases people's risk of experiencing mental health conditions (World Health Organization, February

2024).

The Myanmar and Cambodian people have suffered trauma from war and conflict, and environmental disasters, and it has the potential to worsen because of climate change. My participation in the seminar will allow me to better understand the global prevalence of mental health issues and how economic, political, social, cultural, and other environmental factors impact well-being. My experiences this summer in Cambodia allow me to better educate myself on current conditions across the globe and address those issues in my classroom and across campus in our curriculum. A major aim of the seminar is to better understand *To what extent can Cambodia's and Myanmar's civil society mobilize against these challenges, and by what means?*
